The Fair Board reserves the right to alter all rules, regulations, special premiums or other items included in this premium list, should it become necessary. Fair officials, or any person, firm or corporation, shall not be held liable for any changes or alterations which may be considered necessary or advisable. The Sheridan County Fair Management reserves the final and absolute right to interpret these rules and regulations to arbitrarily settle and determine all matters, questions and differences in regard hereto connected with, or incident to, the Fair. The Board reserves the right to formulate and announce new rules to meet emergencies that may arise later and during the Fair, after it is held. The Board reserves the right to regulate the parking of all automobiles or other vehicles or conveyances within the Fairgrounds and to direct where they shall be driven therein. It may prohibit the running of automobiles in any section of the grounds whenever, in its opinion, common safety demands it. The Fair management reserves the right to exclude from the Fairgrounds any person or persons whom it shall deem undesirable, or who shall violate any rules laid down by the management or who shall otherwise become offensive. No claims for injury to any person or property shall ever be asserted nor suit instituted or maintained against the Sheridan County Fair, its officers, or its agents, or in behalf of any person, or firm, or corporation, or its agents, representatives, servants, employees having
license or privileges to exhibit on the Fairgrounds or occupying space.

## Entries

1.Entry form deadline is Friday July 7 ${ }^{\text {tr }}$, 2023, at $5: 00 \mathrm{pm}$ at the Extension office at the Courthouse. No entries will be accepted after this date. Open Class exhibits are to be brought to the Fairgrounds between 5-8PM on Tuesday July 25, 2023. Except Floriculture, Baking, and Horticulture which can be brought in Wednesday July $26^{\text {th }}$ between 7am-9am.
2. All $4-\mathrm{H}$ exhibits will be interviewed and judged at a designated time. The Extension office will let you know your time to be interviewed.
All exhibitors are requested to fill out their own entry blanks. Entry blanks may be obtained from the Fair Office or Extension office or the Exhibitors Handbook or you can fill them out online at http://www.co.sheridan.mt.us/index.php/fair/
book
3. Please pick up your entry tags at the Extension Office at the Courthouse and place them on our exhibits prior to bringing them to the Fairgrounds.
4.Judges will not award prizes to unworthy exhibits. This rule will be strictly adhered to whether there is competition or not.
5. Every entry must be in the name of the Bonafede owner and must have been produced or made by the exhibitor since the last Fair and must not have been previously exhibited at the Sheridan County Fair. 6. No exhibitor will be given more than one premium under any one number.
7. Please return all VOID entry tags-items entered but not brought in, when you bring your exhibits in.

Exhibits

1. All exhibits will remain in place until Sunday July 30, 2023, at 8 AM. Exhibits removed without permission are subject to forfeiture of premium money won on exhibits.
2.Every exhibit entered will be under the control of the fair board. While every precaution will be taken for safekeeping of the same, the fair board will not be responsible in any case for any loss, damage, or accident that
 may occur.

## JUNIOR CLASS

Pursuant to the NOXIOUS WEED CONTROL ACT Title 7, Chapter22, Sections MCA 2003 and ADMINISTRATIVE RULES, ARM 4.5.201 through ARM 4.5.203, noxious weeds will not be allowed to be exhibited at the Sheridan County Fair. Upon notification the Sheridan County Weed District will determine if plants displayed are noxious. If plants are noxious weeds, they will be disposed of immediately in the proper manner. For a copy of the law and list of designated noxious weeds, contact Craig Underwood at 765-3415.

Flower exhibits may be brought in between 7:00 am- 9:00 am on Wednesday July $25^{\text {th }}$. NO LATE ENTRIES WILL BE ACCEPTED. Flowers maybe brought in in the bud stage if they will be open by the time the judges work with them.

In Class 2 cut flowers should be displayed in clear glass containers only (fruit Jars make good display vessels). Other containers, other then glass, will be disqualified. Use small vases for small flowers. Use plastic wrap.

All flowers must be grown by the exhibitor.

We encourage the exhibitor to name the variety of flower, especially new kinds.
HINTS TO EXHIBITORS
Exhibits in this department are judged on the following basis: size, color, and stem quality of material and foliage.

BLOOM: an individual flower, disbudded with foliage attached, on one stem.
SPIKE: a flower structure with flower stemless on a common lengthy stalk.
SPRAYS: portions of plants with a number of flowers on one stem
STALKS: all the flowers carried on one stalk
STEMS: one flower to each stem, except where all flowers are carried on one stem such as sweet peas or carnations. This does not include separate items growing from the main stem.
FLOWER SINGLE: a flower with one row of petals around a center
DOUBLE: a flower with more than one row of petals around a center.

COLOR SOLID: all petals the same color, same shade.
BLEND: lighter or darker units to tones with same or different color.
SHADED: one color blended.
VARIGATED: two or more distinct colors on the face of the petals, the variegating color arranged in dots, flecks, splashed, stripes, or narrow lines which contrasts with the base color.
BI-COLOR: two distinctly clear and sharply separated colors on the face of all petals.
ASIATIC LILLIES: flowers face outward ORIENTAL LILLIES: flowers face upwards TIGER LILLIES: petals curve back, flowers face downward. Remove just pollen pad.

## TIPS FOR PREPARING YOUR EXHIBIT

The best time to gather garden flowers is after sundown when evaporation is at its lowest ebb, and the blooms are preparing to replenish the moisture lost during the day. If this is impossible, gather them very early in the morning before the sun is high and while the dew is still on them. Cut the stems slantwise and strip off only the lower leaves.

When cutting the garden flowers, take a bucket with you containing several inches of water. Immediate placing of cut flowers in water offsets the shock of cutting and prolongs freshness. When your return to the house, fill the bucket up to the necks of the flower with cold water and leave it in a cool, dark place overnight. Don't crowd your flowers in the bucket or you will be unable to remove them later without bruising petals. Several hours of standing in deep water instills
a hardening process that lengthens the flowers life and makes them easier to arrange

Flowers should be cut cleanly at an angle with a sharp knife and place at once in deep water if stems are roughly cut, squeezed or pinched by a dull instrument, the tube like cells that take in water may become clogged.

All foliage that is below the waterline should be removed. Foliage should be clean; any broken, diseased or disfigured foliage or petals removed. All flowers with woody stems or semi-woody stems should be split, crushed or pound before being placed in deep water, to allow them to absorb moisture. Leaf stems should be split by making lengthwise cuts at the stems end with sharp clippers.

Flowers whose stems exude a milky substance should have stems sealed. This can be done either by steeping the ends for a few seconds in and about 2" of boiling water, (protect flowers and foliage from rising steam) before plunging them into deep cold water or by singeing the ends with a lighted candle as you pick the flowers. These processes seal the ends, but stems take in moisture through the pores above the sealed portion.

Cut dahlia and rose stems LONG enough to retain 3 sets of foliage. Be sure to cut all flowers with as long a stem as possible. Later you can cut them to suit your arrangements. Use saran wrap crumpled in the bottom of the
vase or jar to raise short stemmed flowers up to display them at a good advantage.

Products must have been canned within the past twelve months. Exhibit canned foods in regulation half pint. Pint, or quart jars and label each exhibit. Each jar must have a ring. Follow USDA recommendations for proper jar sizes. Some preserved foods such as jams, jellies, preserves, salsa. Etc. are not to be canned in quart jars. If your recipe does not give a time for a jar size, that jar size is not recommended for that product.

All vegetables and meats must be pressure cooked.

Fruits may be hot water bathed or pressure cooked.

Pickles, jams, jellies, etc. must be pressure cooked.

Jelly- Just the strained juice from fruit is used to make jelly. Crystal Clear jelly is gelatinized enough to make it firm and capable of holding its shape outside the jar, yet it is soft enough to spread easily.

Jams- Jams are made by cooking crushed or chopped fruits with sugar into a mixture of even consistency. Sometimes jams have been strained.

Preserves- preserves are preserved with sugar so that the fruit retains its shape, are clear and shiny, tender and plump, not shriveled. Shriveled fruit indicates through saturation with thick syrup. The pieces of fruit should be uniform in size and shape (large or small).

Butters- Fruit pulp which has been pressed through a sieve, cooked with sugar to a thick consistency that will show no separation of fruit and juice. The mixture should move very slowly with a strong pull from sides of the container when turned to the side. It may move in a solid mass.

Conserves- Conserves are jam-like products made by cooking two or more fruits with sugar. A true conserve contains nuts and raisins.

Marmalades- Marmalades are soft fruit jellies containing small pieces of fruit or peel evenly suspended in the transparent jelly. Shape of fruit should be retained and evenly distributed through the syrup.

## HINTS TO EXHIBITORS

In judging threshed grains, the points most considered are purity, uniformity, and fitness of the sample for the purpose for which that particular grain is used.

In sheaf samples of grain, peas, and safflower, the evidence of high yielding ability and the condition of the samples are regarded as important. Sheaves of grain are not judged on the forage qualities.

Forage exhibits are judged on their value. This means that the entire plant is considered. Proper curing, which retains the leaves and color, is essential in preparing forage exhibits.

THRESHED GRAINS- Sample may be previous year's grain if not exhibited at an earlier fair.

Take a sample from a bin or freshly threshed grains and have it thoroughly cleaned. You may hand pick broken grain and weed seeds out. A two-quart sample is required.

FORAGE AND GRASS SHEAVES- Select the leafiest types in the field of finer stems and cut near the ground. Spread the forage in layers on a board or on a screen in a dark place such as in an attic and leave dry and cure. Turn occasionally. This prevents molding and preserves the dark green color of the leaves. Do not strip any leaves and select only the finer and most leafy stems. Forage and grass sheaves are only tied once at the base.

NOTE: All sheaf grains and forage crops and grasses must not be less than $21 / 4$ " or more than 5 " in diameter just below the bundle head. They should be tied in a least 3 places, except forage sheaves which should be tied only once. They should all be cut even at the bottom.

HINTS TO EXHIBITORS: The following are a few pointers on how to produce, handle and prepare vegetables for an exhibition.

The most important points to consider when selecting a vegetable for exhibit are the quality
and condition of the vegetable. The vegetable should be ready for immediate use. Exhibits should be free from disease, insect damage, mechanical injury, and defects. Vegetable exhibits should be comprised of specimens that are practically perfect from a physical standpoint. Medium sized produce is generally preferred to large produce. Uniformity of individual items, a point which applies to exhibits that include more than one specimen is particularly important.

Asparagus- The spears should be round, straight, and at least $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ in diameter measured 1 " from the trimmed butts and 7 " -9 " in length after trimming. There should not be more then 1 " of white showing at the bottom and no purple overcast except for purple varieties. Spears should be brittle and easily punctured. The tips should be tight with no opened bracts. The bunch should be neat and held together with cord or rubber bands placed near the butts and just below the tips.

Beans-Green or Yellows- The pods should be well-formed and neither spindly nor too short. They Should be firm, brittle, tender, succulent, bright in color and free from stringiness and injury. They must not be dried or over mature.

Cauliflower- The pure white curd should be at least 4" in diameter, regular, dense, and smooth. There should be no "riciness". The solid stem should be firm and cut $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ to $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ below the bottom leaf. 4-6 leaves should remain after trimming to protect the head. Trim these leaves to extend 1 " above the curd

Celery- The specimens should be evenly green or creamy, depending on type, and trimmed, leaving no more then 3 " of the root. All small or broken outer stalks should be removed. An overall length of $14^{\prime \prime}-18^{\prime \prime}$ is acceptable, measure from the remaining tips of the cut root to the tip of the average length of the longer branches. The heart should be welldeveloped and firm. The see stalk should be no longer than $1 \frac{1}{2}$ times the diameter of the plant. The plant may be washed and should be very clean.

Chard- The leaf-blades should be uniform in color, crisp, bright, fully expanded, tender, and fleshy. They may be washed and placed in water to maintain freshness

Corn, Sweet- The cobs should be well-filled. The kernels should be in the milk stage. The water and dough stages generally indicate under or over maturity respectively.
Specimens should have trimmed, fresh, green, tight husks. Loose husks should be removed. Do not clip the ear tip. The shank should extend a maximum of $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ from the cob.

Cucumber- Slicing cucumbers should be from $6^{\prime \prime}-9 "$ in length and not more than $2^{\prime \prime}$ in diameter. They should not be "fat", but more slender, and longer then the pickling type. Pickling cucumbers should be no grater than 1 $1 / 4 \prime$ in diameter and no more than $31 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ in length. The length should not be less than $21 / 4 "$ times the diameter. The shape should be relatively straight with blunt ends are not constricted in any
place. The general skin conditions for both types should be smooth except for warts and spines which should be removed for pickling cucumbers. The general color should be uniform and medium to dark green. Cucumbers should not be puffy, dull, or yellow color. Stems should be cut about $1 / 4$ "in length. Do not wash cucumbers, but clean gently with a soft brush.

Garlic- The necks should be dried and trimmed to $1^{\prime \prime}$ and roots trimmed close to the bulb, which should be at least $11 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ in diameter. The outer sheath should enclose the bulb and be very clean. The cloves should fit tightly and be well filled.

Kale- Specimens may be washed. Edible portions should be tender and of a good green color. Cut stems off within $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ of the blade.

Kohlrabi- The "ball" should be approximately $3^{\prime \prime}$ in diameter, very smooth, tender, and crisp. The main stem should be removed just below the ball and all but 5 leaves removed. Leaves to be removed should be trimmed so that their remaining leaf stalks are approximately $1 / 2 "$ in length. The leaves remaining should be fresh, crisp, and undamaged. Bunch by tying the leaf stems.

Lettuce-Crisphead and Butterhead- Seed stalks should be absent. Specimens should be average in size and reasonably firm. Remove all but 6 to 8 wrapper leaves. The stem should be cut close to the bottom leaf. The head is usually not washed.

Lettuce, Leaf- Seed stalks should be absent. Exhibit the whole plant with the stem cut at the crown. The plant will usually be 8 " -12 " across. The plant should be washed.

Onions-Specimens should not be less than 2" in diameter. They should be well-shaped and not split, doubled, or have enlarged necks. Trim the tops to a maximum of 2 " in length. Bulbs should be firm, mature, and yielding to moderate pressure. Roots should be removed just below the bulb base.

Onions, Green Bunching-Overall length (excluding roots) should be not less than 8 " or more than 24 ". The bulbs should be at least $1 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ and at most $1^{\prime \prime}$ in diameter. The tops should be fresh, crisp, have a good green color, and may be clipped if desired. Other qualities are the same as for bulb onions.

Parsley- Place the roots in damp material to reduce wilting. The stems should be neatly trimmed and the display has an overall length of $8^{\prime \prime}$ to $10^{\prime \prime}$. The leaves should have a uniform green appearance. Parsley may be washed. Curly parsley usually makes a better display.

Parsnips- The largest diameter should be $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ to 3 ". They should be smooth with rootlets removed but tap root remaining and light cream in color. Crown should be well hollowed and the cores small. Avoid rubbing. Soil may be removed by soaking the roots in water.

Peas, Green, Unshelled- Should be large enough to accommodate 3-4 well developed please, but not over-mature which is indicated
by wrinkling and a dull greenish-white cast. Pods should be well-filled, slightly velvety, bright green, and firm with no discolored calyxes.

Peas, Edible-Pod, Unshelled-Pods should be tender and not as well-filled as those of green peas. Otherwise, the quality of green peas holds for edible-pod peas as well.

Peppers, Hot-(Red-cluster type- should be approximately $1 / 4$ " in diameter and $2^{\prime \prime}-3^{\prime \prime}$ long.) (Cone type-should be approximately $1^{\prime \prime}-21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ long) (long type-should be approximately 2 " thick at the stem and 5 " $-12^{\prime \prime}$ long, tapering to a point.) All specimens should be free from bronzing or other discoloration, and not be shriveled. All types should be bright red or yellow with no green coloration. Colors should not be mixed within a single exhibit. The stems should be trimmed to $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ to $3 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ in length. Taste should be definitely hot and pungent.

Peppers, Sweet- Specimens should be free of bronzing or other discoloration, and not be shriveled. They should be approximately 3 " -3 $1 / 2 \prime$ long and $3 "$ in diameter, well-shaped, and not indented or curved. Every specimen should have an equal number of lobes. The fruit should be firm, thick-fleshed, and with the stem trimmed to the shoulder level. Green peppers should have no reddish blush. Red or yellow peppers should have no green coloration. Colors should not be mixed within a single exhibit.

Potato- Round or intermediate potatoes should be at least $21 / 2$ " and not more than 4 " in
diameter. Long potatoes should not weigh less than 6 oz or more than 1 pound. Specimens should be mature with firmly attached skin. They should be bright, firm, well-shaped, and free from greening, sprouting, shriveling or other damage. The tubers should be very clean, but not washed. They may be brushed lightly with a soft brush to remove loose soil.

Pumpkin-The specimen should be well shaped, mature, clean and with 2 " -4 " of the stem intact.

Radishes- The largest diameter should be $3 / 4$ " to $13 / 4^{\prime \prime}$ for globe type and $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ to $3 / /^{\prime \prime}$ for icicle type.

Rhubarb- The stalk should not be less than 1" across its flat side measured halfway along the stem length. After trimming the stalk, length should not be less than $12^{\prime \prime}$. The stalk should be smooth, and have been pulled when harvested. Not more than $1^{\prime \prime}$ of the tops should be left untrimmed. Basal bracts should be removed and the stalks neatly bunched with rubber bands near the top and bottom. The exhibit should be free from any damage.

Rutabaga- The largest diameter should be $3^{\prime \prime}$ 4 ". Specimens should be smooth with no side roots.

Spinach- Specimens may be washed. Edible portions should be tender. Seed stalks should generally be absent. The stems should not be excessively long relative to the blade size. Leaves should be large, broad, thick, and either well-savoyed or smooth.

Squash, Summer- Stems should be trimmed to $1 / 4 /$ to $1 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ in length. Specimens should be young, tender, and sound, and may be cleaned with a soft brush.

Squash Winter-Specimens should be well matured (hard rind) and clean.

Sunflower- Clean, dry heads with seeds intact and with no pest infestation or rot are measured for the largest head in diameter.

Tomatoes, Ripe- the diameter should be at least $21 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ except for preserving and paste tomatoes. For preserving types, 'Red Cherry’ should be less than 1". The "Yellow Plum" 1 1/2" across and 2 " long, and the 'Red' or 'Yellow Pears' $2^{\prime \prime}$ long. The paste type should be $1 \frac{1}{2 \prime \prime}$ across and $31 / 2^{\prime \prime}$ long.

Turnips-the diameter should be $1 \frac{1}{2 \prime \prime}$ to $3^{\prime \prime}$. Specimens should be smooth with rootlets removed but $2 "-3$ " of tap root remaining.

Zucchini-Should be 5" to 7" in length and waxy on the outside and have a rubbery feeling.

ROOT CROP SPECIMENS SHOULD HAVE NO ROOTLETS OR RIDGES. THEY SHOULD BE TOPPED, TOPS SHOULD BE NEATLY TRIMMED TO $1 / 2$ " TO $1^{\prime \prime}$ ABOVE THE CROWN.

Special Awards
Special Awards may be a Judge's Choice and/or Sweepstakes Award (the most blue ribbons) or Best of Show. The judge may give awards in areas not mentioned.

Enter the student in the grade they just Completed. Disguise teacher comments with stickers or whiteout when appropriate.

Be aware that papers will be stapled on display boards after judging.

Computer printouts or hand-written essays should be mounted on construction paper or if an entry consists of multiple pages, enclose entry in a clear plastic binder.

Class projects can only be submitted by a teacher or representative of the class. Individual student projects will NOT be accepted as an entry for class project. If entry is from a special need's student, please make a note or comment on the entry for so it can be brought to the judge's attention. Please check other Departments to see if items can fit into their lot number if you can't find a lot number in this department, especially for art projects created in school art class.
